LO: To understand what a fable is.	LO: To compare 'The Boy Who Cried Wolf' and 'The Ant and The Grasshopper.'	YR3 LO: To answer comprehension questions about The North Wind and The Sun.	LO: To role play a familiar fable.	For our exciting writing this week, we are describing a picture. Think about using expanded noun phrases and prepositions to add detail to your description. You are banned from using boring adjectives like big, small, sharp etc. Choose exciting words - you could use a thesaurus to help you in your planning.
In our first lesson for this unit, we are looking at 'The Hare and The Tortoise' to think about what a fable is. Use the PowerPoint to explore more about fables and the key features. Use the story of 'The Hare and The Tortoise' to spot the key features and see if you can work out the moral of the story. EXT: Research and find out more information about Aesop and his fables.	Today we are comparing 'The Boy Who Cried Wolf' and 'The Ant and The Grasshopper.' Use the PowerPoint to read through the story of The Boy Who Cried Wolf first. Then fill in the table, thinking about the characters, setting and plot of the story. Can you work out what the moral is? Then, read the version of 'The Ant and The Grasshopper' that matches your reading level and complete the rest of the table. Complete the additional questions, at the bottom of the sheet using full sentences. Think about why these stories might be a good way to teach children right from wrong.	Use the PowerPoint to practice answering retrieval and inference questions. Use this as a recap of how to answer comprehension questions in a reading paper. Then, choose the differentiated level of reading and questions that matches your understanding about the fable 'The North Wind and The Sun.' Remember to read the story again if you are unsure of an answer.	In this lesson, we are using drama to retell our favourite fable from the week. With your family at home, see if you could recreate one of your favourite fables using mime (that means acting without talking!)
