Fun facts:

- Egyptian men and women wore makeup. It was thought to have healing powers, plus it helped protect their skin from the sun.
- They used mouldy bread to help with infections.
- They were one of the first civilizations to invent writing. They also used ink to write and paper called papyrus.
- The Ancient Egyptians were scientists and mathematicians. They had numerous inventions including ways to build buildings, medicine, cosmetics, the calendar, the plough for farming, musical instruments, and even toothpaste.
- The Pharaoh kept his hair covered. It was not to be seen by regular people.
- Cats were considered sacred in Ancient Egypt.
- The Ancient Egyptians are very famous for building the pyramids, amazing structures created as tombs for the rich and powerful. Incredibly, they have remained standing for thousands of years and can still be visited today!
- People in Ancient Egypt believed in the afterlife and practised Mummification, a process that preserved the body of the deceased.
- They wrote using hieroglyphics, and produced some of the world's first examples of mathematical writing.

Learning Journey — We will be exploring Ancient Egyptians.

We will look at what Ancient Egyptians were really like and discover what it would have been like to live in those times. We will be exploring how the Egyptians used hieroglyphics as a written form of communication and discover the importance of artefacts in ancient history. We will look closely at Egyptian death masks and understand the purpose of these. The children will develop their Geography skills by discussing the key features of a river, explaining its purpose and linking this to the River Nile. They will also build on their chronological awareness of where the Ancient Egyptians fit in history and how this links to our past and future topics.

The children will use their researching skills to find out information about Cleopatra VII, last pharaoh of Egypt, as well as Egyptian Gods and Goddesses, and their importance.
