Significant Beliefs	There is only one god. Jesus is the son of God and was crucified on a cross and then rose from the dead before ascending to heaven. Through believing in Jesus' resurrection, and following the teachings of Jesus about loving their neighbour, they will have eternal life with God in Heaven.	There is only one god. The Jews are God's chosen people. The Torah tells them how they should live and that actions are more important than beliefs.	Allah is the only god and Muhammed (PBUH) is his Prophet. To be a Muslim, believers must recite a statement of faith called Shahada. On the day of judgement, humanity will be divided between Paradise and Hell.	Brahman is the supreme god and is found in everything and in many different forms. Hindus believe in Karma - life is a cycle of birth, death and rebirth. The reincarnation of someone's soul in the next life depends on how they lived their previous life.	The Buddha is not a god. He searched for truth and enlightenment. Buddhists follow his teachings by refraining from: harming living things, stealing, sexual misconduct, lying or gossiping, drinking or taking drugs.	There is only one god who cannot be seen. He created the universe and so everything is part of God. Sikhs are always trying to become one with God by avoiding pride, anger, greed, attachment and lust (bad karma).
