

Humans have lived in what we now call France for around 50,000 years.

Stone age people left artefacts behind which help us learn about them.

Eventually, the hunter-gatherer people started to settle and build communities about 6-7, 000 years ago.

Stone circles and monuments were built – perhaps for worship.

The Romans, led by their emperor Julius Caesar, invaded the land they called Gaul in 58 BCE.





Roman culture and technology had a great influence on Gaulish lives.



This aqueduct carried fresh water into the city from many miles away.



The Gauls began to worship Roman gods and speak Latin.


Roman control ended in AD 486. They were forced out by the Frankish people, led by their King, Clovis.





King Charlemagne.


King Charlemagne made himself emperor not just of France but of the whole Holy Roman Empire in AD 800.

She led the French army to save the people of Orléans, so she is known as 'The Maid of Orléans'.


The Renaissance brought famous artists and culture to France.

French traders and explorers travelled the world. France controlled many colonies and territories.




The kings were absolute monarchs and spent huge quantities of state money on their favourite projects.

Angry people took control because they wanted a free and fair life for all: Libérté, Égalité, Fraternité was their new motto.








The King (and many thousands of other 'enemies of the people') were executed using the fearsome guillotine.

France in 1804.




The poor people had many years to go before their lives were really improved.

'Cosette', illustrated by Emile Bayard, is a character from Victor Hugo's famous novel of 1862, *Les Misérables*.




It wasn't all doom and gloom though. France has produced some of the world's most famous artists, scientists and philosophers!






Louis Braille invented his system of reading and writing for blind people in 1824.

France today is the world's most visited country. What would **you** like to see or do there?




