Activity 2:

Attitudes

Britain is made up of a range of nationalities, cultures and ethnic groups. The author of the poem thinks that this is a good thing. Have you heard any other views about it?

Negative attitudes towards different cultures and ethnicities might be perceived as racist. If you repeat these negative opinions, they might be recorded as a racist incident.

Activity 3:

Make a list of all the benefits that you can think of for living in an ethnically diverse society.

- Of these people, around 50% were born in Britain.
- Significant numbers of white British people live in other countries around the world.
