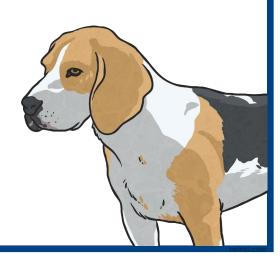


The Great Plague

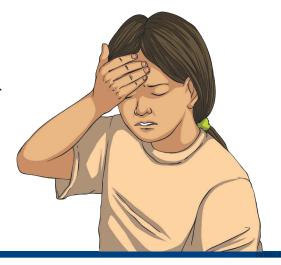
5. What did the houses and buildings in London look like during the seventeenth century?

Answers

Challenge 1

Dogs and cats killed rats. As so many of them were destroyed, there were fewer predators to kill the rats, which meant that the rat population continued to grow and grow and the bacteria began to spread further.

Challenge 6

Children's own information poster about the symptoms of the plague. Symptoms should include painful swelling of the skin, blisters, headaches, fever and sickness.

Challenge 7

Answers may vary; however, children should back up their opinions with description of why they think this based on evidence, e.g. doctors — They felt frustrated as they did not know how to help people and this is the job they trained to do and want to be able to help others. They were scared because they did not want to become infected while visiting patients. We know this as they used to wear elaborate clothes, including a large beak nose and a hat and scarf and big coat.

Challenge 8 (Could include research as well)

There were many alternative remedies. People held small bunches of flowers to their noses as they thought that this would stop them from breathing in bacteria and poisonous air. Many wore lucky charms, ate toads, bathed in milk and drank fine wines. People tried these remedies as there was no cure, and at this time, lots of people used household items to treat coughs and colds. They were scared of getting the plague and would try anything to prevent it.
