

Reporting the use of the Pupil Premium

Great Staughton Primary Academy 2015 to 2016

Overview	The Pupil Premium is designed to ensure that funding to tackle disadvantage reaches the pupils who need it most. The funding is allocated to Local Authorities and schools with pupils from Reception to Year 11 who are eligible for free school meals (FSM), who are looked after or have parents currently in the Armed Forces. From 2012, the coverage of the Premium was widened to include those eligible for FSM at any point in the last six years. In 2015/16 pupil premium is £1320 per pupil.
Total amount allocated to the school for the current academic year	Great Staughton Primary Academy has been allocated £18504 pupil premium this year.
Explain how last year's allocation was spent	Intervention groups run by teachers in addition to quality first teaching in the classroom. Free milk to all children qualifying for pupil premium funding. ECAR specialist to work with individual pupils as well as groups of pupils. 1:1 readers. Staff development of curriculum provision and feedback. 1:1 tuition out of the classroom where required. Financial support to enable children to go on educational school day trips and residential trips along with after-school clubs. School Improvement Teachers employed to support the continual development of teaching and learning within the school. Numicon and phonics training for TAs. Enrichment activities – such as funding swimming lessons. Emergency uniform and PE kit where required. Emergency breakfast provision. Pastoral support group for all forces children. Financial contribution towards music lessons.
How will the money be spent this year?	Intervention groups run by teachers and the Head of School in addition to quality first teaching in the classroom. Free milk to all children qualifying for pupil premium funding.
