




The sea snail slithered all over the rock and gazed at the sea and the ships in the dock and as she gazed and sniffed and sighed.


"The sea is deep and the world is wide!

This is the whale who came one night when the tide was high and the stars were bright.


A humpback whale, immensely long, who sang to the snail a wonderful song of shimmering ice and coral caves and shooting stars and enormous waves.
